#### Rev. Ross Writes...

In this week's stories from Mark, we have Mark's description of Jesus' travels which looks geographically ridiculous, describing a giant loop instead of a simple return journey. He had travelled from Capernaum to Tyre, why not return the same way, instead of going north to Sidon and looping around Galilee? Some commentators think this is a sign

that Mark, writing in Rome traditionally, didn't know the geography, but what if this is Mark describing a whole journey through Gentile territory? While the text points to Jesus trying to get away from the crowds in Galilee and have a rest, the path that Mark describes points to Jesus being on mission outside Jewish territory. Indeed, these stories – the woman with a sick daughter, the man with hearing and speech difficulties, and the second feeding of the thousands – may be Gentile stories, included in the telling of Jesus ministry to help include the Gentile members of Mark's community.

The difficulties we find in these stories may stem from the fact that they are not Jewish accounts of Jesus, but Gentile ones. The details speak of a different culture with different priorities. While Jews looked down on dogs, house dogs were common in Gentile areas, allowing the woman to respond to Jesus. To avoid any misunderstanding of Jesus being a magician, he takes the man with hearing difficulties aside, away from the crowd. The different number of baskets of leftovers after the feeding – 7 instead of 12 – hint at the conventional understanding that there were 70 nations. Imagine the joy of Gentile members of early Christian communities finding 'their' stories in the written Gospels, and in their language – Greek. This new faith was not just a spin-off of Judaism, it was a new, inclusive way of walking with God. It allowed them to say, 'Jesus is God with us', as much as the Jewish members.

Some will say of scripture, "God said it, I believe it, that settles it", the more I read scripture, the more I see stories and poems and teaching that are designed to be wrestled with. Like the Old Testament story of Jacob wrestling with an angel; it's OK to have questions, to look deeper, and to not just accept the surface story. The Bible is not a is not a simple, face value, how-to manual. It's meant to make us think.
